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THE LEGACY OF 1848 THROUGH TODAY - 2017 TRANSPLANTED IDEAS & VALUES IN AMERICA'S PAST AND PRESENT

The "Forty-Eighters" were a relatively small number of individuals who emigrated from Europe in the late 1840s and early 1850s after fighting unsuccessfully with both pen and sword for liberty, democracy, and national unity. Many of the German Forty-Eighters immigrated to the United States. After settling in America, these unique and talented individuals provided an intellectual transfusion affecting not only their fellow German immigrants, but also the political and social history of the United States during one of its most critical periods.

Many of the Forty-Eighters left lasting marks in the fields of politics, education, business, journalism, the arts, and the military. Carl Schurz, perhaps the most well- known of the German Forty-eighters who settled in America, achieved great success in no less than four of these areas. During his long and illustrious career, he was an ambassador to Spain for President Lincoln, a general during the Civil War, a United States senator, and the Secretary of the Interior under President Rutherford B. Hayes. He served as chief editor of the Detroit Post, editor and co-proprietor of the Westliche Post in St. Louis, editor- in-chief and one of the proprietors of the New York Evening Post, and as an editorial writer for Harper's Weekly. Noted for his high principles, moral conscience, and avoidance of political partisanship, Schurz, like many of his fellow Forty-Eighters, can still teach us much with regard to dealing with the problems that confront us all today.

Thee significance of the legacy of Carl Schurz has become more timely. With the steady increase of immigration to the United States, and Germany, it has become ever more important to establish the proper framework for the absorption of newcomers. Schurz's solution — assimilation with the retention of the newcomers' ethnic heritage — is as valid today as it was when he articulated it in the 19th century. The fusion of ethnic identities and American values is of the greatest importance, and Carl Schurz's life is a worthy paradigm for all immigrants to emulate.

At the end of December 2015 she left Leo Baeck Institute New York where she was Executive Director for 18 years, before becoming International Director in 2013 in order to open an office in Berlin and expand operations in Germany.

Mrs. Strauss holds a Bachelor's degree in Political Science from Columbia University and a Master's degree in International Relations from Hunter College. Before her position with the Leo Baeck Institute, she worked as a Senior Editor at the 20th Century Fund in New York, a public policy organization, as well as Senior Editor at the Hudson Institute, a think tank headed by

Herman Kahn. For many years she was assistant book editor at the renowned Council on Foreign Relations in New York.

In addition to her professional career, Mrs. Strauss commits time to charity and volunteer work. She was Vice President of the American Federation of Jews from Central Europe and past President of the Congregation Habonim in New York City, a former Trustee of Self-Help and a Trustee of Leo Baeck Institute. In January 2015 she was honored to receive Germany's highest civilian honor, the Commander's Cross of th Order of Merit, issued by Federal President Joachim Gauck. Ten years before she received the Order of Merit, First Class, of the Federal Republic of Germany from German President Horst Köhler. In 2009 she was awarded the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.

Mrs. Strauss has been featured in a number of biographies such as the "Who's Who in American Women" and the "Who's Who in the East".

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MARCUS BRACKLO

Marcus Bracklo, Bad Soden, Germany, holds a Bachelors Degree in Economics from University College London and a Masters Degree in Economic History from the London School of Economics. At the beginning of his career he worked as an economist for the Organisation of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) in Paris. His subsequent career was in the private sector, as a Partner with Price Waterhouse and a Managing Director of Oppenheim, before setting up Baigo Capital, a private equity firm. Marcus became interested in the history of German Emigration to the Americas for personal reasons. He has researched his family's emigration history to the USA and Latin America and published a monograph on this subject in 2010. He is currently working on a biography of his ancestor Theodore Bracklow, a 48er from Schleswig Holstein who became an organizer for the Republican Party in New York and died as an officer of the New York 163rd at the battle of Fredericksburg. Eric Braeden is from Bredenbek, in the German state of Schleswig-Holstein. Eric is a German-American Hollywood star whose original name is Hans-Jörg Gudegast; he lives in Pacific Palisades, CA (known as "Weimar am Pazifik" since 1933). Across from his house is the elegant villa where Thomas Mann, a German literature Nobel laureate from Schleswig-Holstein, had spent his years in exile during the Second World War. Braeden has appeared in over 120 TV productions and films, including "Titanic" (1997). Beginning in 1980, he has made daily appearances on US TV, as well as in 28 other countries world-wide with "The Young and the Restless," and in 1989 he founded the "German-American Cultural Society." In 2007, Eric became only the second German actor (after Marlene Dietrich) to receive a Star in the Hollywood Walk of Fame. He published his memoirs in February of 2017: I'll Be Damned: How My Young and Restless Life Led Me to America's #1 Daytime Drama.

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RICHARD CRAWFORD

Richard P. Crawford Jr. was born and raised in Grinnell, Iowa, where he attended a school for the blind. Rich overcame many obstacles in his high school career. He graduated from Wartburg College in Waverly, Iowa, with majors in Business Administration and Business Education. Rich and his wife Sara have been married since November 20th, 1982 and have three children and two granddaughters. He enjoys fishing, reading, deer hunting, and other outdoor activities. Gabrielle Robinson was born in Berlin in 1942. After her baccalaureate, she earned her BA from the University of Illinois in 1964, her M.A. from Columbia University in 1965, and her PhD from the University of London in Modern Drama in 1968. Until her retirement she has worked at universities in Europe and mostly in the U.S. Gabrielle has published many articles and seven books, among them German Settlers of South Bend, and The Reluctant Nazi , a memoir/biography based on her grandfather's diary in Berlin 1945. She also writes a monthly entry for the newsletter of the Jewish Federation of the St. Joseph Valley. Gabrielle has been awarded an Ehren und Dankmedallie from

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Arzberg, Germany, when she helped establish a sister city relationship with South Bend, as well as a Sagamore of the Wabash, Indiana's highest honor.
